The documentary follows the stories and fates of four people accused of blasphemy. The most famous of them is Asia Bibi, a Christian woman who was falsely accused of blasphemy by her Muslim co-workers after a disagreement.

As the world awaits the outcome of Asia Bibi's trial, Khadim Hussain Rizvi uses the blasphemy law as a key platform to run for prime minister of Pakistan in the upcoming elections. Amidst the hysteria, those who oppose him and even his own followers become pawns in the ultimate quest for power.

The Habit of Prayerlessness

It's all too easy to slip into the habit of prayerlessness, yet prayer is (or ought to be) the central feature of the Christian life. Prayer is vital: not only for our own survival as individual Christians, but also for the life of the church.



After all, if we claim to be God's people, trusting in Him as our Father, we will talk to Him as His children, thanking and praising Him for all His provision for us, and asking Him to meet our needs.

One question we need to ask ourselves is: why do we pray?

Here are some reasons why Christians pray:

- We know that God is our creator and we rely on Him for everything we have; so we pray for what we need and thank Him for what we have.
- We know we are sinners, but that God is merciful; so we repent and pray for forgiveness.
- We know we are weak and can achieve very little on our own, but God is powerful and can do far more than we could ever imagine; so we pray for His
- We know that we are children of God, and that He is our loving Father who delights to hear our prayers; so we pray and praise Him for His love for us.

But if we have got into the habit of not praying, then we need to ask: why do we not pray?

The reasons we don't pray are the direct opposite of those above:

- We think we are self-sufficient; so we don't need to ask our creator for anything, and we've no need to thank anyone for what we've gained ourselves.
- We think we are basically good; so we presume God owes us, and there's nothing we need forgiveness for.
- We think we are strong, and can achieve what we need by ourselves; so we don't need His help.
- We think we are not really God's children; so we assume He doesn't want to listen to us.




The Bible Society of Lebanon has asked for prayer after the blast that hit the capital Beirut last week
