The government's proposed New Plan for **Immigration** presents the biggest change to our asylum system in a generation, and is set to greatly reduce the UK's acceptance of asylum seekers. The Hospitality Pledge will work in coalition with other UK and international charities to speak up for all asylum seekers; we will also aim to help those who are persecuted for their religious beliefs and encourage people around the UK to offer hospitality to refugees and asylum seekers in their homes where they can.

The Story of 'How Great Thou Art'

Have you ever wondered how one of our best-loved hymns came to be written?

1934: A village in the Carpathian Mountains.

Anna reads from a Russian Bible, her words precise and careful. She is the first person in her village ever to do

so - the first person ever to learn to read

Her guests listen in rapt attention as she tells them of Jesus. A dozen men and women turn to Christ, exclaiming their wonder at the love of God.

At that moment, a stranger arrives.

34-year-old Stuart K Hine has been cycling through the mountains for weeks, sharing the good news of the gospel and giving out Bibles.

Inspired by the wonder of God's creation, he is already halfway through composing the words of a song that will one day be sung all over the world. Seeing such a moment of revelation for the people of this village, he writes again.

The first verse was inspired by a thunderstorm in the first village he reached; the second by the green woods and fresh glades alive with birdsong, through which he travelled.

Stuart arrived in Anna's village just in time to hear people exclaiming at the revelation of God's love, prompting him to write the third verse.

The final verse was written 14 years later, whilst Stuart and his wife were ministering to war-weary refugees in Europe in 1948.



NHS Blood and Transplant needs your help. We have an upcoming blood donation session at GHS Cultural Centre, Preston on **Wednesday 30**th **June**, with lots of available appointments. You could help by booking an appointment to donate blood today!

We are working closely with the rest of the NHS to keep supplying lifesaving blood to hospitals during the coronavirus pandemic and we need people to keep donating as normal. We have extra safety measures in place and every precaution is being taken to eliminate the risk of covid-19 transmission at our blood donation sessions. Having an appointment to give blood is classed as essential travel and will be exempt from any local or national travel restrictions.

Black, Asian and minority ethnic donors are also specifically needed right now, because:

Some patients who receive frequent blood transfusions need blood to be closely matched to their own.

A number of blood conditions, like sickle cell disease which is treated through blood transfusions, most commonly affect black, Asian and minority ethnic people.

The best match typically comes from blood donors from the same ethnic background.
